AusIS University Fair

This week, our school was the setting for an engaging and educational gathering, with speakers from renowned colleges from Europe, Australia, and the United States. Institutions like the University of Bristol and Coventry University from the United Kingdom, Monash University from Australia, and other universities from around the world participated. Students ranging from MYP 5 to DP 2 got the opportunity to visit the booths, where they could learn about potential future destinations. subjects study and requirements.

Students displayed an inquisitive nature by asking substantial questions. The school provided them with refreshment such as coffee and snacks. There was great excitement among the students when they saw their aspirational universities at the event, which made it an energetic and participative occasion.

Collaborative Sciences Project

The DP-2 students have shown immense hard work in their collaborative sciences project. Through rigorous research, data collection, and experiments, the students have demonstrated the effectiveness of filtering water from different sources in Dhaka. They first collected water samples from various locations, laying the groundwork for their comprehensive investigation.

The biology students played a crucial role by identifying indicator species while observing the surrounding regions of the water sources to locate sources of pollution and impurities. This initial assessment helped provide context for the analysis conducted by the other groups.

Meanwhile, the Environmental Systems and Societies (ESS) students measured the pH, total dissolved solids (TDS), and salinity of the water, while the chemistry students filtered the water and tested the levels of iron, copper, chlorine, nitrites, and alkalinity. Lastly, the physics students measured the heat capacity of normal distilled water alongside the samples collected after filtration, contributing to a holistic understanding of water quality in the region.





KARATE

As part of their CAS (Creativity, Activity, Service) program, IBDP students have been diving into Karate, blending fun with valuable learning experiences. In their classes, they've mastered fundamental techniques like Zuki (punch), Mae-Geri (front kick), and various Uke (blocking) methods. The focus on proper form and technique not only improves their physical abilities but also enhances their mental concentration.

Alongside striking techniques, students engage in specific stretching routines to boost flexibility and prevent injuries. This mix of rigorous training and camaraderie fosters a rewarding atmosphere, where students gain confidence and learn essential life skills such as discipline and respect. ESS GAME LAB

In our most recent ESS lab, DP Year 1 students explored the concept of "The Tragedy of the Commons." 
